From the Observation Post The President's View By Gil Bernabe

2018 is going to be a year of "Remembrance" for the artillerymen who have served with the 17th Artillery Regiment. For some Vietnam veterans this year is a BIG 5 – 0. Fifty Years! Yes – it has been 50 years since many of us were in Vietnam, somewhere in the Central Highlands, operating out of An Khe base camp, and conducting supporting fire missions all over the Central Highlands area of operations.

While 2017 marked the 100th anniversary of the 17th Artillery Regiment, 2018 will mark 50 years since the 1968 Tet Offensive; since the April 3, 1968, Viet Cong sapper attack on Charlie Battery, 2d Battalion, 17th Artillery. August 2018 will also be 50 years since Bravo Battery suffered the losses of PFC Clifford Draper and Corporal Stephen Jordan. It is also 50 years since a former Commander, 2d Battalion, 17th Artillery, LTC Robert Whitbeck, was killed during Tet while assigned to his new unit.

Our November 2018 Reunion in the Washington Area will commemorate all of the 17th Artillery's Vietnam Fallen Heroes. The Prayer Vigil at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial and at Arlington Cemetery will also pay respects to other 17th Artillery soldiers who were killed in action during other military operations.

The four scholarships to be awarded in 2018 are named for the artillerymen of Bravo Battery and Charlie Battery, 2nd Bn, 17th Artillery who were killed in Vietnam. The 17th Artillery's 2018 Scholarship Program is also announced and provides information on

contacting the Scholarship Committee Chairman, Gil Bernabe, to request a scholarship application.

In this issue of the Castle Newsletter, we again find the results of Tom Kurtz's superb research. First, he provides us a list of 2018 "Regimental Milestone." Tom also pays homage to our fallen 17th Artillery brethren, who were killed during the Korean War. In a third article, he provides a summary of facts about how our 40 scholarship winners are related to our 17th Artillery soldiers and the wars/combat operations our related veterans fought in.

REGIMENTAL MILESTONES for 2018

1918: (100 years ago), (World War I), *January 2, 1918, The 17th Field Artillery Regiment arrived by train at Camp du Valdahon, France from Brest, France, for a period of intensive training from January 3, 1918 to March 17, 1918. Here at Camp Valdahon, the 17th Field Artillery Regiment was issued their equipment and the French Schneider 155mm Horse Drawn Howitzers.

(World War I), *March 24 to May 13, 1918 the 17th Field Artillery Regiment along with the 2nd Division (US) were located in the Toulon-Troyon Sector, On March 19, 1918 at Rupt, France the Regiment fired its first rounds at the Germans.

(World War I) *Armistice Day, November 11, 1918 (Meuse-Argonne Offensive) the 17th Field Artillery Regiment was located at Beaumont, France, here the regiment fired their last rounds of the war. The regiment fired a total of 119,021 rounds during the war. The regiment was awarded two Croix de Guerre with Palm and the French Fourragere, for their actions during the war. In addition, Battery D was the only separated US Battery to be awarded a Croix de Guerre with Gilt Star.

*November 17, 1918, 17th Field Artillery Regiment began their march from France through Belgium to

Bendorf, Germany; arriving on December 16, 1918 and was designed a unit of the Army of Occupation.

1923: (95 years ago), *May 8, 1923, the 17th Field Artillery Regiment Distinctive Unit Insignia is approved.

1933: (85 years ago), *Battery D, 17th Field Artillery Regiment, the Ford Light Truck Battery (Experimental), travel in January 1933 to Fort Ethan Allen, Vermont for winter testing, with stops at Fort Humphrey and Fort Myer, Virginia

*March 1933, Battery D 17th Field Artillery Regiment, the Ford Light Truck Battery (Experimental), started their road march from Fort Bragg, North Carolina to Fort Sill, Oklahoma, with stops at Fort Benning, Georgia, and Fort Sam Houston, Texas along the way.

At Fort Sill, the trucks, equipment and howitzers of the light truck battery were turned over to Battery A, 1st Field Artillery Regiment.

1943: (75 years ago), (World War II), *January 6, 1943, 17th Field Artillery Regiment proceeded to Chanzy, Algeria (about 60 miles Southeast of Oran) to continued training there and also at Bedeau, Algeria.

(World War II), *2nd Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment left for Tunisia the last week of January 1943 and fired their first round on February 3, 1943 at Kasserine Pass.

(World War II), *February 14, 1943 at Faïd Pass, Tunisia the 2nd Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment was overrun by the 21st Panzer Division (German) resulting in the loss of half of their personnel, all of their equipment and 18 howitzers. Later, the 2nd Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment was reorganized and equipped with 105mm howitzers.

(World War II), *May 6, 1943, the 17th Field Artillery Regiment was in its final positions of the African Campaign in the vicinity of Tebourba, Tunisia, near the Anserine Farm. Here on May 8, 1943, the last rounds of the African Campaign that were fired.

(World War II), *July 13, 1943, 17th Field Artillery Regiment sailed from Tunis, Tunisia for Sicily, as part of the invasion force, arriving at Gela, Sicily on July 14, 1943.

(World War II), *July 1943, During the Sicily campaign, the 17th Field Artillery Regiment supported the 1st Infantry Division, 9th Infantry Division, 3rd Infantry Division, and 45th Infantry Division (all US).

(World War II), *September 3, 1943, 17th Field Artillery Regiment participated in the firing of the preparation for British crossing of the Strait of Messina.

(World War II), *September 23, 1943, 1st Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment sailed from Termini Immarce, Sicily for Italy.

(World War II), *In October 1943, both the 1st Battalion and 2nd Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment were reequipped with 155mm M1 towed howitzers.

(World War II). *October 16, 1943, Regimental Headquarters and 2nd Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment joined 1st Battalion, 17th Field Artillery

Regiment in supporting VI Corps, north of Volturno River, 1st Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment had already been firing in support of the 34th Infantry Division for the first crossing of the Volturno River.

(World War II), *December 10, 1943, 17th Field Artillery Regiment was relieved of mission supporting VI Corps (US) and assigned the mission of supporting C.E.F. (French Expeditionary Corps).

1948: (70 years ago), *January 24, 1948, Battery B, 17th Field Artillery Battalion, inactivated at Fort Sill, Oklahoma; concurrently, re-designated as Battery C, 17th Field Artillery Battalion and activated on December 15, 1948 at Fort Sill Oklahoma.

*October 1, 1948, 537th Field Artillery Battalion is activated at Camp Carson, Colorado.

1953: (65 years ago), *At the beginning of 1953, the 537th Field Artillery Battalion stripped of most of its personnel, due to the Korean War, was preparing for a training cycle, in order, to train 500 recruits to build back its personnel to a battalion size unit.

1958: (60 years ago), *June 1, 1958, Battery A, 17th Field Artillery Battalion is inactivated and re-designated Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 1st Howitzer Battalion, 17th Artillery (constituted April 24, 1958 and activated in Korea June 1, 1958); Battery C, 17th Field Artillery Battalion is inactivated June 1, 1958 and re-designated Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 2nd Howitzer Battalion, 17th Artillery and activated at Fort Sill, Oklahoma June 25, 1958. (The 537th Field Artillery Battalion transferred its equipment and personnel to the 2nd Howitzer Battalion, 17th Artillery); Battery B, 17th Field Artillery Battalion is inactivated on June 1, 1958 and re-designated 3rd Howitzer Battalion, 17th Artillery (organic elements constituted June 1, 1958 and were activated June 25, 1958, in Germany) (The 802nd Field Artillery Battalion is re-flagged as the 3rd Howitzer Battalion, 17th Artillery); Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 17th Field Artillery Battalion is inactivated June 1, 1958 and is re-designated 7th Howitzer Battalion, 17th Artillery and assigned to the 2nd Infantry Division (organic elements constituted and activated May 2, 1960 at Fort Benning, Georgia).

*June 25, 1958, Headquarters and Headquarters Battery 537th Field Artillery Battalion is inactivated and re-designated Headquarters and Headquarters Battery 8th Howitzer Battalion, 17th Artillery and activated August 1, 1967 at Fort Campbell, Kentucky (organic elements constituted April 16, 1967 and activated August 1, 1967).

1963: (55 years ago), *January 25, 1963, 7th Howitzer Battalion, 17th Artillery, at Fort Benning, Georgia is re-designated 7th Battalion, 17th Artillery.

*February 15, 1963, Battery A, 2nd Howitzer Battalion, 17th Artillery (Fort Sill) is re-designated Battery A, 2nd Howitzer Battalion, 42nd Artillery and sent to Fort Benning, Georgia to join the newly formed 11th Air Assault Division.

*February 25, 1963, 6th Howitzer Battalion, 17th Artillery (USAR) is inactivated at Bogaluse, Louisiana.

* June 6, 1963, Battery A, 2nd Howitzer Battalion, 17th Artillery is reconstituted and resumed its role in the battalion's mission at Fort Sill, Oklahoma.

*August 1, 1963, 4th Howitzer Battalion, 17th Artillery (USAR) is re-designated as 4th Battalion, 17th Artillery.

*December 1963, Battery B, 3rd Howitzer Battalion, 17th Artillery moves to Merrell Barracks, Nuremberg, Germany, here the 3rd Gun Battalion, 39th Artillery (280mm gun) is inactivated and its personnel are assigned to the 3rd Howitzer Battalion, 17th Artillery to form a M110 8-inch howitzer battalion attached to 210th Artillery Group

1968: (50 years ago), (Vietnam War), *February 9, 1968, Battery D, 2nd Howitzer Battalion, 17th Artillery (Provisional) was discontinued.

*April 1, 1968, 2nd Howitzer Battalion, 17th Artillery is re-designated 2nd Battalion, 17th Artillery (Vietnam War), *April 3, 1968, Battery C, 2nd Battalion, 17th Artillery near Tuy Phuc, South Vietnam was attacked by an unknown number of enemies, from 0130 to 0530 hours. This attack resulted in the highest number of casualties suffered by the battalion during the Vietnam War: 11 KIA, (1 officer, 10 enlisted); 27 WIA, (2 officers, 25 enlisted).

(Vietnam War), *November 12, 1968, SFC Victor V. Evans, Chief of Firing Battery, fired the 750,000 round for the battalion from Battery A (Forward), 2nd Battalion, 17th Artillery.

1973: (45 years ago), *September 1, 1973, the 4th Battalion, 17th Field Artillery (USAR) is relieved from assignment to the Third United States Army and assigned to First United States Army.

1978: (40 years ago), *July 1, 1978, 3rd Battalion, 17th Field Artillery is released from attachment to 72nd Field

Artillery Group and attached to 210th Field Artillery Group.

1983: (35 years ago), *March 31, 1983, 3rd Battalion, 17th Field Artillery is inactivated in Germany and reflagged as 3rd Battalion, 5th Field Artillery.

1988: (30 years ago), *March 1988, 3rd Battalion, 17th Field Artillery is converted to a M110A1 8-inch SP battalion.

*July 16, 1988, 5th Battalion, 17th Field Artillery is withdrawn from the Army Reserve, allotted to the Regular Army and activated in Germany assigned to 210th Field Artillery Brigade; the 2nd Battalion, 28th Field Artillery is re-flagged at 3rd Battalion, 17th Field Artillery activated in Germany as a M109A3, 155mm SP battalion attached to 210th Field Artillery Brigade.

1993: (25 years ago), *1st Battalion, 17th Field Artillery (Fort Sill) participated in the 75th Field Artillery annual exercise "Taut Lanyards" in the massing of fires. The battalion fired in two Combined Arms Live Fire Exercises (CALFEXs), conducted battalion Field Training Exercise (FTXs) and with their Evaluation Exercise Evaluation (EXEVAL) in August that prepared them to support the 1st Cavalry Division at National Training Center (NTC).

*2nd Battalion, 17th Field Artillery (Fort Sill) became the Army's first unit to field the M109A6 Paladin in June; they conducted New Equipment Training (NET) and collective training in July and August and was certified as the first Paladin battalion in its September EXEVAL.

*3rd Battalion, 17th Field Artillery (Fort Sill) trained on their Multiple Mission Essential Task List (METL) to deploy, fight and sustain operations, their first, since the battalion moved from Europe to Fort Sill, in order to support the 3d Armored Cavalry Regiment at NTC.

*5th Battalion, 17th Field Artillery (Fort Sill) trained on their METL tasks to deploy, fight and sustain operation; underwent their first EXVALs since their movement from Germany to Fort Sill and started preparing to convert to a Multiple Launch Rocket System (MLRS) battalion.

1998: (20 years ago), *1st Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment (Fort Sill) began the year with several field exercises, training on new Paladin tactics then later

deployed nearly simultaneously to Fort Chaffee, Arkansas and Darwin, Australia.

*2nd Battalion, 17th Field Artillery, 2nd Infantry Division (Korea) was in direct support to the Army's only light/heavy brigade the battalion spent the year honing their skills, by synchronizing live prep and Suppression of Enemy Air Defense (SEAD) fires, conducting more than 30 CALFEXs, and fired live copperheads for both ground and aerial observes.

2003: (15 years ago), (Operation Iraqi Freedom), *March 29, 2003, the 1st Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment departs Fort Sill, Oklahoma to Kuwait, as Task Force 1-17, to support the operations of the 4th Infantry Division in Iraq, as an attached unit. Task Force 1-17 provided direct support to the 1st Squadron, 10th Cavalry Regiment (Task Force Saber).

(Operation Iraqi Freedom), *April 14, 2003, 1st Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment (Task Force 1-17) enters Iraq with the 4th Infantry Division. The 1st Battalion fired its first mission against "Target Sadden", a defensive network around Balad Airfield, Iraq.

*September 1, 2003, 6th Howitzer Battalion, 17th Field Artillery (USAR) is re-designated 6th Battalion, 17th Field Artillery.

*November 15, 2003, 2nd Battalion, 17th Field Artillery becomes the organic artillery unit for the 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 2nd Infantry Division (Korea).

2008: (10 years ago), *(Operation Iraqi Freedom) January 10, 2008, the combine Batteries of Battery B and Battery C, 1st Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment, deployed to Iraq, as Battery C, 1st Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment, as a convoy security company, station at Contingency Operating Base Adder, Talill, Iraq.

*February 2008, Battery A, 1st Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment (Fort Sill) sent a small detachment to Fort Bliss to support the 3rd Battalion, 13th Field Artillery Regiment. The majority of the rest of its members of the 1st Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment were reassigned to the 3rd Battalion, 13th Field Artillery Regiment, which later deployed to Iraq, on a Brigade Interment Security Mission.

2013: (5 years ago), (Operation Enduring Freedom), *January 2013, 2nd Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment, 2nd Stryker Brigade Combat Team, 2nd Infantry Division returned from Afghanistan, to their home station at Joint Base Lewis-McCord, Washington.

*December 11, 2013, 1st Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment is inactivated at Fort Sill, Oklahoma.

VIETNAM VETERANS MEMORIAL TURNS

VFW has supported all endeavors of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund—from The Wall to its yet-to-be-built education center.

The Vietnam Veterans Memorial was dedicated 35 years ago on Nov.13, 1982. Since then, more than 100 million people have visited the iconic structure, according to Jan Scruggs, founder of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund. The National Parks Service noted that nearly 5.6 million people visited in 2016, making it the nation's second-most popular memorial or monument. The Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C., was the top attraction with nearly 8 million visitors last year.

The Vietnam Veterans Memorial is more popularly known as "The Wall" because its central feature is a long black granite wall that lists the names of all 58,318 (as of May 2017) U.S. troops who died in the Vietnam War.

Donations from more than 275,000 individuals and other entities paid for the wall's construction. VFW contributed more than \$300,000 and was one of its earliest champions.

Scruggs, a Vietnam War veteran and member of VFW Post 341 in Washington, D.C., said VFW "never wavered" in its support of The Wall when other organizations were against its design.

Here are some facts about one of the most popular memorials in America.

Maya Lin, the designer of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, earned only a B for her design in a class at

Yale. However, Lin's design was chosen over her professor's entry by a group of architects assembled by the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund, according to the book Maya Lin by Tom Lashnits

The average age of the service members on The Wall is 22 years, 9 months.

ITEMS LEFT AT THE WALL

More than 400,000 items have been left at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial since 1982. Many of these items—ranging from letters to service members on the wall to service medals and ribbons—are displayed online at www.vvmf.org/items. The Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund plans to display about 4,000 to 6,000 items left at the wall at the yet-to-be-built Education Center at The Wall.

CHRONOLOGICAL ORDER

The Wall was designed to place the names of service members killed in Vietnam in chronological order of death rather than alphabetical order.

Air Force Technical Sgt. Richard B. Fitzgibbon Jr. is the first American service member killed in the Vietnam War. He died June 8, 1956, but his name was not on The Wall until May 31, 1999. His son, Richard B. Fitzgibbon III, also was killed in the Vietnam War on Sept. 7, 1965.

The last name on the wall belonged to Air Force 2nd Lt. Richard Vandegear, who died on May 15, 1975. Vandegear was killed on Koh Tang Island off Cambodia during an attempted rescue mission. Some of Vandegear's remains were buried in Arlington National Cemetery in May 2013, according to The Plain Dealer, a newspaper in Cleveland.

VFW Support

VFW so far has contributed nearly \$650,000 toward the construction of the memorial's yet-to-be-built education

center. It will be called The Education Center at The Wall. The plan is for the center to be an "interactive learning facility" in Washington, D.C., according to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund.
